



It's just one block of wood with a series of cutouts. First drill the holes, then trim each edge to form the openings. To Set the heights for the screws to act as the depth stops, search through your collection of miscellaneous screws for ones that would sit about where you want them and have a little extra thread to hold in the wood. After collecting screws and drilling pilot holes, use a screwdriver and small ruler to fine-tune their heights by hand.

Liquor Cabinet Completed Toqua Sports Bar ~ Bruce Barbre

Skyler McClurkin (the Food Service Manager for all the restaurants in Tellico) contacted me in late February to see if the Club would be willing to custom build a liquor cabinet for a hallway in the Toqua restaurant. They needed more storage space for liquor stock, etc. In further discussions Skylar indicated that he wanted a piece maximizing storage, in a design to match the style and color of the woodwork in the existing bar area. Other design elements requested were locks for the doors, glass doors on top and interior lighting. Over a couple of meetings we worked out the details. I had indicated that we would be happy to take on the project, but it might take a while as, at that time, we were still working on cabinets for the Our Place expansion and I also had quite a bit of travel planned for the Spring and Summer.

Aaron Cox and I did the majority of the build in Aaron's shop, but we had significant help. Lloyd Donnelly and Dick Hoffmann contributed design ideas during our initial meeting with Skylar. Dick then developed detailed plans for us in SketchUp and a couple of revisions. Lloyd, Aaron, Wes Braudaway, Barry Brandt, and Vince Evans helped cut the plywood to rough sizes, Bob Fagerlin, Randy Neuhaus, Bob Brown and Scott Christiansen helped plane the solid oak to final thickness, Peter Hulton cut the half-blind dovetails for the drawer fronts, and Rick Mannarino, Bryan Moses and John Johnson helped with other details. Vince, Dan Greenlee and Jim Dezutti helped Aaron and me with the installation.


